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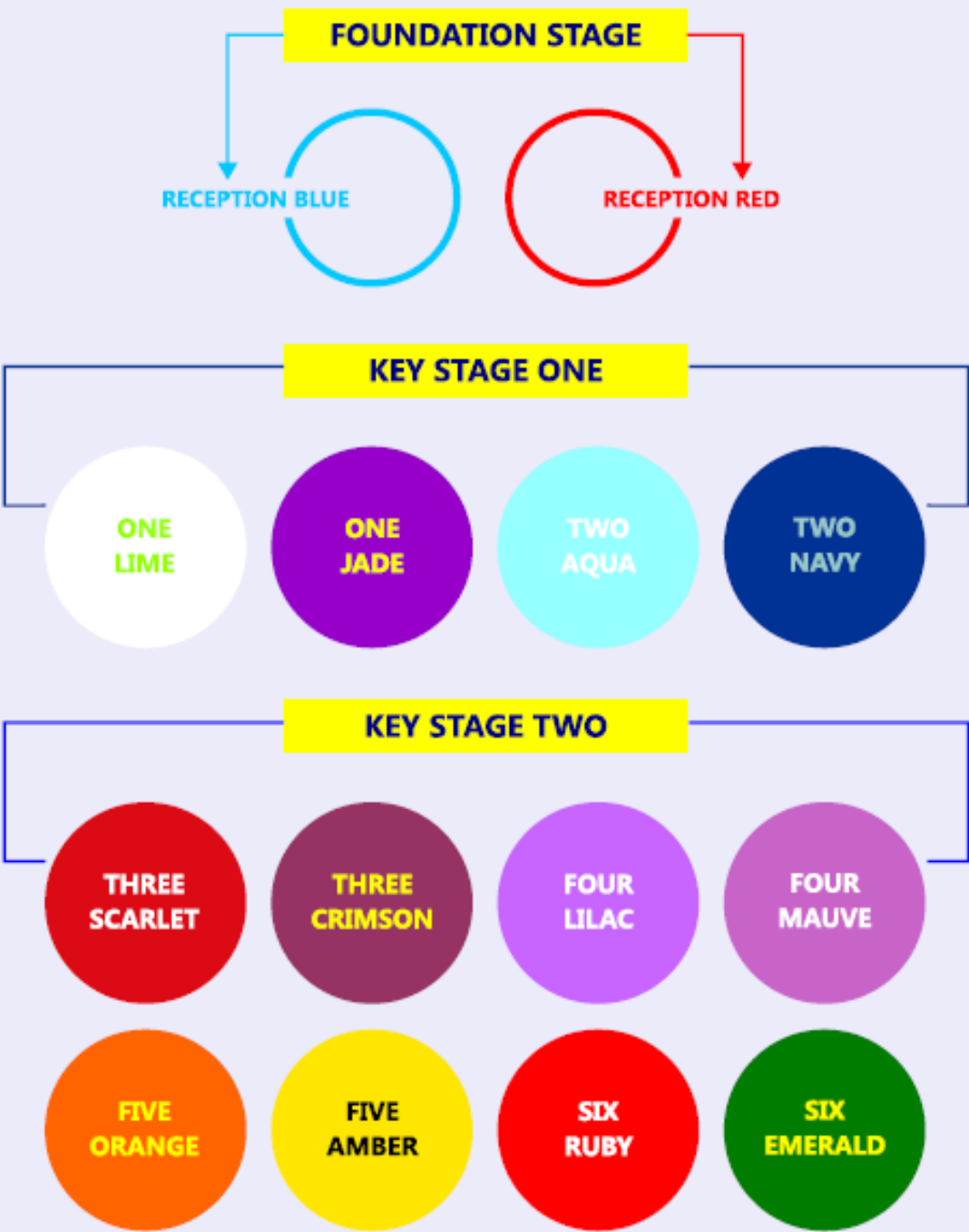
WELCOME TO ST. SAVIOUR’S SCHOOL IKOYI

Please find the time to read it. It also contains details of the type of clothing and equipment you will need to purchase before term begins. This is an exciting time for everyone concerned and it is our aim to make it a positive and happy experience.

CURRICULUM

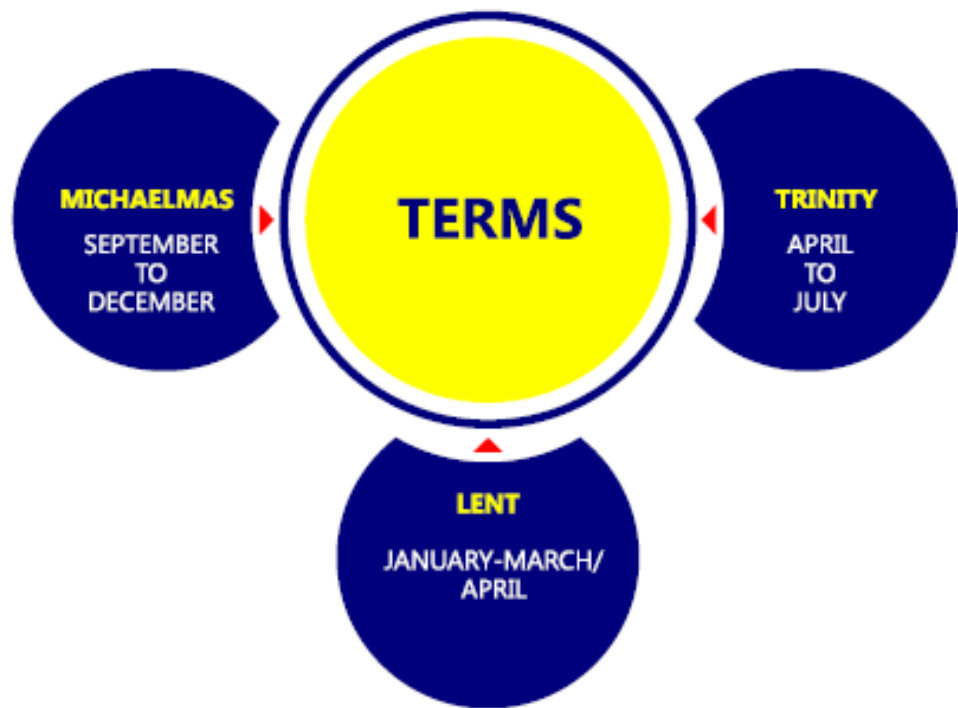
St. Saviour’s School Ikoyi is a British-style primary school. The curriculum follows, but is not limited to, the **English National Curriculum**. Children start school in the Reception classes. They then progress through Year One to Year Six. Reception is known as the Foundation Stage of learning, Year One and Year Two are known as Key Stage One and Year Three to Year Six are referred to as Key Stage Two.

TERMS

There are three terms in the academic year at St. Saviour's School Ikoyi. The first term is Michaelmas term, from September to December. The second is Lent term, from January to March/ April (depending on when Easter Falls) and the third is Trinity term, from April to early July.



SCHOOL DAY TIMINGS

The school day begins at 7:55am. Teachers are on duty from 7:30am and children can start arriving from this time. Whilst appreciating the difficulties of travelling in Lagos, please make every effort to have your child at school ready to make a prompt start to the day. Being late is not only distressing for your child but causes a distraction for pupils who are already settled. Lateness can only cause your child to miss out on important learning at the start of the day.

School finishes at 2:30pm promptly and children must be collected from their respective classrooms punctually. Reception children must be collected by a person recognised by the teachers wearing an appropriate I.D badge.

They are not permitted to wait for siblings who are involved in after school activities. If for any reason, your child's 'going home' arrangements have changed, the teacher must be notified either verbally or in writing. If your arrangements have changed at short notice please call the school office, and they will pass on the message to the class teachers.

PROGRAMME OF STUDY

The Reception Curriculum is a continuation of the Nursery Curriculum and it follows the Early Year's Foundation Stage Guidance. It involves children learning through structured and unstructured play activities as well as a progressively more formal approach in preparation for their entry into Key Stage One.

Children are taught through 7 areas of learning specified by the Early Year's Foundation Stage Guidance. The areas of learning are:



THE EARLY YEARS FOUNDATION STAGE CURRICULUM

The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) curriculum sets the standards for children's care, development, and welfare from birth to five years old. We follow this curriculum in Reception class, which is designed to encourage your child's all-round development through play-based and child-initiated learning experiences.

The EYFS is built around seven areas of learning:

COMMUNICATION AND LANGUAGE

Listening, Attention, and Understanding: Children maintain attention, concentrate, and sit quietly during appropriate activity.

Speaking: Children extend vocabulary, especially by grouping the meaning and sounds of new words.

Understanding: Children listen and respond to ideas expressed by others in conversation or discussion

PERSONAL SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Self-Regulation: Children can acknowledge their own and others' emotions, regulate their behavior to support it, and offer active listening to the teacher.

Managing Self: Children feel confident, able to bounce back, and stubborn in the face of challenge. They manage responsibility for their fundamental hygiene and personal needs and appreciate the worth of healthy habits.

Building Relationships: Children play and work cooperatively, build constructive relationships, and are attuned to others' needs.

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

There are three P.E lessons each week taught by the P.E teachers this includes one PE class, one swimming class and one Music and Movement session taught by the music teacher. All children are required to wear the full P.E kit during physical education lessons and bring along the swimming kit for swimming lessons.

This consists of:

- A pair of navy shorts*
- SSS white round-necked T shirt with the school badge (see House System on page 16 for KS2 children)*
- Plain white trainers(plimsolls or gym shoes)*
- Plain white socks*
- The school's approved swim wear.*
- Goggles*
- Swimming cap*
- Towel*
- Gym bag to put swimming kit in.*

When buying footwear to be worn at school, please purchase white shoes with velcro (or buckle) fastenings as children of this age find laces difficult to manage independently. We discourage the wearing of jewellery at school and for safety reasons, it should not be worn at all during P.E lessons. If ears are pierced, stud earrings ONLY are permitted. All uniform and items of clothing must be clearly labeled with your child's name.

Gross Motor Skills - Children move safely, demonstrate strength, balance, and coordination when playing, and move energetically (e.g., running, jumping, dancing, hopping, skipping, climbing).

Fine Motor Skills - Children grasp a pencil effectively, demonstrate precision in using tools and equipment, and achieve control needed for writing.

LITERACY

- **Comprehension** - Children show that they have understood what has been read to them by retelling narratives and stories and predicting important events in stories.
- **Word Reading** - Children recite sounds for every letter in the alphabet and a minimum of 10 digraphs, read words by their phonics understanding, and read aloud simple sentences.
- **Writing** - Children produce known letters, sound-spelling in words, and write sentences and phrases that can be read.

Reading

In the first term children will “read” picture books to develop their comprehension skills. The children will learn to handle and care for books properly, observe details, listen to and answer questions, form opinions, retell story sequence and talk spontaneously about what they see. Gradually, words will be introduced as they become more phonetically aware and are able to use pictorial and contextual clues to work out text.

Library

Twice a week the children have a library lessons taken by our librarian, they are taught how to care for, choose and handle books and they listen to stories and tapes demonstrating the many genres in literature, Each week the children choose a book which the take home to share with parents, The Library book should be returned on or before the day of the Library lesson so that another one may be issued. If you like the book to be changed before the normal Library lesson day, you my accompany your child to the library before or after school.

Please note that lost or damaged books incur a replacement fee of N2500 per book.

Your child will need a large back pack/trolley bag with a separate pocket for carrying books. Your child will be given a blue folder where all work will be sent home in. This includes their Library reading book.

In addition, children will learn a large number of ‘tricky words’ (words that cannot be decoded phonetically) using the ‘look, say, cover’ approach.

Each child will progress at their own pace in reading throughout this developmental stage, it is expected that most children will have basic reading skills by the end of the Reception year. It is widely recognized that children progress more rapidly when there is interest and practised at home. Ten minutes day is recommended when a child is refreshed, keen and happy to do so.

Writing Including Spelling and Handwriting

This includes the development of the motor control nd manipulative skills. The children will engage in activities to help them develop a correct pencil grip, left to right orientation and correct formation of lower-case letters. Please note that we use lower-case letters when writing and only use capital letters when it is grammatically correct to do so. It is important that children develop a correct pencil grip and learn correct letter formation from the beginning, To help with this we involve the children in a number of practical activities such as tracing and colouring, It s important that they are able to hear, identify and write the sounds they know which eventually begin to form recognizable words. Therefore these skills re systematically taught early on in Reception, children will be given opportunities to experience writing for a variety of purposes, using features of different forms.

MATHEMATICS

Number Calculating

The children will engage in activities to aid the sorting, matching, classifying, making and identifying of sets, one-to-one correspondence, conservation of number, oral counting to and from 20 and beyond, recognition of numerals up to 10 and beyond, writing numerals to 10 and beyond and ordinal numbers to 10

In practical calculation activities children will begin to use vocabulary in adding and subtracting such as, more than, equal to. They will have a practical introduction to addition and subtraction and money using British coinage. Children will be taught to use a range of strategies to aid calculations, including the use of numbers lines and simple mental strategies

Shapes and Space

Various practical tasks and activities will be undertaken to help the recognition of 2 dimensional and 3 dimensional shapes, and to develop mathematical language to describe them, Children will learn to recognize and recreate simple pattern and use appropriate language to describe the position of things.

Measures

Comparisons will be made using mathematical language relating to length, height, size, weight and capacity. Time is introduced at a basic conceptual level such as days of the week, O'clock and Half past.

Number

Children have a secure knowledge of numbers to 10, including composition. They subsidize (know how many without counting) to 5 and automatically recall number bonds to 5 and some to 10.

Numerical Patterns

Children confidently count to greater than 20, compare quantities, and explore patterns. They identify even numbers and odd, double facts, and the ways in which amounts can be split equally.

UNDERSTANDING THE WORLD

Past and Present

Children describe the daily life of people surrounding them, understand the past via settings and characters from stories, and identify similarities and differences between things in the past and at present.

People, Culture and Communities

Children explain their neighbourhood, recognize similarities and differences between different religious and cultural communities, and explain similarities and differences between life in this country and life in other countries.

The Natural World

Children explore the natural world, observe and draw pictures of plants and animals, and recognize important processes and changes in the natural world.

Religious Education (RE)

The children have R.E lesson once a week with the R.E teacher, As well as stories from the bible, the children learn about festival of other religions and aspects of good citizenship. This extends to two lesson per week in Key Stage one.

Informationand Communication Technology (ICT)

As well as daily access to the classroom computer, the children go to the Mac Suite once a week, Using a range of software children participate in activities that develop basic computer skills, such as using a mouse, keyboard and developing competency in loading, accessing and closing down programme. In addition, all classes in the school are fitted with an interactive white board (Smart Board) which is an integral part of supporting the children’s learning each day

Development of Skills

The following skills are essential to this area of learning and can also be developed across the curriculum.

- Observing:** sorting and grouping
- Comparing:** Sequencing
- Classifying:** Asking/Answering questions
- Enquiring:** Investing
- Exploring and experimenting:** thinking
- Listening:** Solving problems
- Making decision:** Recording
- Predicting and testing:** communicating
- Reflecting:** Evaluating
- Describing**

EXPRESSIVE ARTS AND DESIGN

Creating with Materials

Children investigate and work with a variety of materials, tools and techniques, exploring color, design, texture, form and function in a safe manner. They discuss their creations and how they were made.

Being Imaginative and Expressive

Children create, improvise and retell stories and tales with peers and staff. They sing songs, make music, dance, and experiment with ways of changing them.

Music

The children have two music lessons each week in the Music room with the Music teacher.

Art

The children have one lesson a week in the Art room with the Art teacher Additionally, In class, children are given opportunities to explore color, texture, shape, form and space in two and three dimensions and express and communicate ideas, thoughts and feelings using a range of materials and suitable tools.

Drama

The children have one drama lesson per week with the drama teacher. The children engage in representational play and role-play both in and outside the classroom. Role-playing is also extended to sand and water play where the children make scientific discoveries.

ENRICHMENT ACTIVITIES

How Children Learn - The Characteristics of Effective Learning

With these areas for learning, we focus on children's learning through the Characteristics of Effective Learning:

Playing and Exploring: Children discover and learn about things, and 'have a go'

Active Learning: Children concentrate and keep trying if they become stuck, and enjoy achievement

Creating and Thinking Critically: Children develop and express their own ideas, make connections between ideas, and think about ways of doing things.

ASSESSMENT IN RECEPTION

Throughout the year, children are assessed against the **Early Learning Goals (ELGs)**. These describe the expected level of development in each area of learning through an online learning journal system called Tapestry to record observations and photos of your child's learning journey. Reports are sent home alongside the learning journal every term summarizing your child's development, strengths, and next steps in each EYFS area. These reports help you understand how your child is growing and what they'll focus on next.

St. Saviour's School Ikoyi has adopted the assessment system of the National Curriculum and children in Reception take the baseline test during the 'Michaelmas' Term and during the Trinity Term. In addition to other tests, the standard Assessment Progress Test Series are taken by all children at the end of the year.

S.T.A.R.S - Setting Targets And Reaching Success.

By the end of the Lent term in Reception children are well on their way to becoming independent writers. To support their learning and to help them progress further in writing each child is given individual targets. These targets will be shared with parents at the Lent Parent Conferences and with the children during the lessons. This is the beginning of the target setting which will continue throughout your child's education at St. Saviour's and which will track your child's progress in writing as she/he moves through the school.

THE EARLY LEARNING GOALS

The Early Learning Goals provide the standard of development that children are expected to achieve at the end of the Reception year. Teachers will monitor whether children are:

Meeting the expected level - achieving the Early Learning Goal

Working towards the target level - developing but not yet achieving it

Going beyond the level expected - working above the expected standard

This assessment ensures an easy transition into Year 1 and gives your child's next teacher useful insights into their areas of strength and development.

COMMUNICATION

At St. Saviour's School Ikoyi, we do our best to establish and maintain clear lines of communication. You will be expected to sign whole School Agreement at the beginning of each academic year. Newsletters from the Headteacher are emailed to parents on a weekly basis and additional information is passed on periodically. Class Teachers also email a weekly bulletin to parents to support at home extended learning. Information, unless stated otherwise, applies to all children in the school. Teachers in Reception ensure that letters go home in the children's folder or are handed to the child's carer. Please ensure that your home-help are instructed to keep and pass on all letters and circular from school. You may also be contacted by text messages and emails.

It is very important that St. Saviour's School Office is informed if you, or your designated emergency contact's address or telephone numbers change. Similarly we find it very useful if we are kept informed if either parent is away from home, when older siblings return to boarding school, if medication is being taken etc. as these may be a reason for a change in your child's behaviour.

PARENT / TEACHER CONFERENCES

These are scheduled to hold in the first half of the Michaelmas term and at the end of each term. These are important meetings with your child's class teacher giving you the opportunity to discuss your child's progress and to see the work that your child has been doing in school. We allocate two afternoons for these meetings; the meetings usually start at 3pm and run through till 6pm. This is to support working parents with busy schedules. Appointments are for 10 minute periods so it is important that you arrive on time for your allocated slot

ILLNESS

Please do not send your child to school if he or she is unwell. Experience tells us that children recover more quickly, and there is less chance of an infection spreading to the rest of the class and the teachers, if they rest at home. It would be very much appreciated if you would inform your child's teacher if he/she is taking medication of any kind. Medication may affect your child's performance at school and the teacher should be aware of what may be causing a change of behaviour. You should also inform the school if your child has any contagious condition such as chicken pox, impetigo or conjunctivitis and keep the child at home. It may be necessary to supply a doctor's certificate before your child is allowed to resume school.

School Nurse

If your child is taken ill at school or has a minor injury he/she will be sent to our school nurse. She will assess your child's need and administer the necessary first aid. If she feels that a child should be sent home she will inform the parents to come and collect the child. The school nurse will administer medication during school time only on the verbal or written instruction from a parent and only with doctor prescribed medication. To ensure best practice it is important, when your child enters school, that you complete the Medical Questionnaire form and hand it into the school nurse. The nurse can be found in the sick bay which is located in the Payne Library. If you need further clarification or have medical concerns regarding your child please see the school nurse.

HOUSE SYSTEM

Children from Year Three to Year Six are allocated to a "house "or team. There are two House Captains and members of staff are nominated as House Masters or House Mistresses. The Key Stage 2 children will compete in teams for the Sports Day Cup and other house-events. Siblings are assigned to the same house where possible.



For PE lessons, and on days of their swimming lessons, Key Stage 2 children are required to wear their house t-shirts and navy blue shorts

UNIFORM

Girls - St. Saviour's School logo white polo t-shirt, blue adire skirt, white socks, black shoes.
Boys – St. Saviour's School logo white polo shirt, navy blue shorts, white socks, black shoes.
Year Six – St. Saviour's School logo light blue polo shirt (all), navy blue tailored skirt (girls), navy tailored shorts (boys).
The polo shirts, house t-shirts, PE T-shirts, adire skirt and swim uniform printed with the St. Saviour's logo are all available from the school's uniform supplier – located on the school website or at the school before the start of the Michaelmas term.

Please ensure that you purchase uniforms that your child can put on and take off with the minimum of assistance. For example, if your child cannot yet manage buttons and a zip, opt for the shorts with elasticated waists. Additionally, if your child cannot fasten shoe laces please purchase those with Velcro or buckles so that they can manage themselves.

Trainers are only allowed when participating in PE activities, and should be the plain white practical type (not fashion statements) with fasteners that the child can manage independently.

MID- MORNING SNACK

Snack time at school is always a supervised time where hygiene and health are encouraged and good manners expected. We therefore do not permit sweets or fizzy drinks. Food should be packed in a separate box for storage in the air-conditioned classroom. The lunch boxes should contain some nutritious food and enough water to last the day. Please ensure that your child has a bottle/flask that it is leak-proof as well as unbreakable and that your child can open, close and pour it satisfactorily.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES (ECA)

St. Saviour's School Ikoyi runs an after-school activities programme for pupils from Reception to Year Six. Initially, Reception children are usually exhausted by 2.30pm in the first term so the programme is not open to them until the Lent term. We currently have an extensive list of activities after school. Some are free of additional charge and are run by class teachers, however, most require a fee to cover the cost of a specialist external coach e.g. Gymnastics, Chess, Rugby, Tennis, Karate, Drama and football. A link is sent at the end of each term indicating what clubs are available. Please note that Extra-Curricular activities may change from one term to the next to allow for variety of choice.

ASSEMBLIES

Every Monday, there is an assembly for all children that takes place in the school hall. Assemblies alternate between hymn practice and class-run assemblies. During the year each class takes a turn at presenting an assembly to which parents are invited.

On Friday mornings there is a whole school assembly led by the Head teacher which involves a presentation of pupil achievements and other class certificates.

BIRTHDAY BOOKS

It has long been a tradition at St. Saviour's School Ikoyi that on their birthday each child donates a book to the school library. It is not obligatory, however, should you wish to continue the tradition the book should be handed in directly to the school reception office.

BIRTHDAY CAKES

You may, if you wish, send a birthday cake to school on your child's birthday for him/her to share with classmates. The parents are welcome to come to celebrate with their child in the classroom during first break at 10.15am. Other items you may need to bring are paper napkins, paper plates, a knife and candles. It is customary for children not to wear their uniform if their birthday falls on a school day- but please ensure that the clothes he/she decides to wear are suitable for a busy day at school.

SPECIAL EVENTS

There are a number of occasions that have become a tradition in the school calendar. Listed are just a few, but you will be informed of other events as they come up.

Nigerian Independence Day – October 1st

This is a public holiday, and as on all public holidays the school will be closed. However, the preceding day the school organises a celebratory day whereby everyone is encouraged to wear traditional Nigerian clothes. The school will liaise with parents in advance if there is a theme for each year group. A special assembly is held for the whole school. Traditional musicians are invited to perform and there is dancing in the playground at the end of the day to which the parents are invited. Nigerian food has often been the focus of the celebrations with parents bringing a range of traditional Nigerian food for the children to share. As you may guess it is a most colourful occasion.

Foundation Stage and Key Stage One Production

Traditionally, the Foundation Stage and Key Stage One show is scheduled for the end of the Michaelmas term and has a Christmas theme. Each class or year group participates and parents are invited to attend a day and an evening production.

Fun Day

Fun Day is the main fund raising event of the year, held in the Lent term, and organised by the PTA. However, everyone gets involved in some way or other whether by baking cakes, sparing an hour on the day to man a game, or sending in tins, packets and bottles for Tombola.

Sports Day

Starting early in the morning of the day before Lent half – term holiday, the whole school participates in a traditional Sports Day with a wide range of races and other physical pursuits aimed at developing healthy competitiveness and having fun. Upon completion of the Sports Day the school traditionally closes around noon for the half- term holiday.

Annual Prize-giving

At the end of the Trinity term there is a special assembly where prizes are awarded to two children from each class for 'Effort and Achievement' and 'Good Behaviour'. Parents of the prize-winners are invited to attend.

Other events

Book Day, Harvest Festival, Speech Day, Inter-house Maths Day, Inter-house Science Day, Inter-house swim gala, Inter-house debate, Spelling bee and International Day

Parent Teacher Association (PTA)

At St. Saviour's School Ikoyi there is a very active Parents Teacher Association (PTA). Throughout the year they organise a number of events for the children's enjoyment including Santa's Grotto and Discos. The PTA also organises the annual Fun Day which is the major fund-raising event of the year, and really is a great day! All parents are members and an Executive Committee is elected from the parent body at the Annual General Meeting. The PTA organises a welcome coffee morning for parents in the Michaelmas term. We look forward to seeing you there and count on your support throughout the year!



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
